CODE OF CONDUCT

**Reviewed and Adopted by Cofton Hackett Parish
Council: 18th November 2019**

Part 1

General provisions

1) Introduction and Interpretation

- a) This Code applies to **you** as a member, co-opted member or employee of **Cofton Hackett Parish Council**.
- b) You should read this Code together with the Ten Principles of Public Life which are set out in Appendix 1.
- c) It is your responsibility to comply with the provisions of this Code.
- d) In this Code - "meeting" means any meeting of
 - i) the authority;
 - ii) any of the authority's committees, sub-committees, joint committees, joint sub-committees, or area committees;
 - iii) "Monitoring Officer" means the Monitoring Officer for the principal Council which is Bromsgrove District Council;

2) Scope

- a) This Code applies to you as a member of this authority when you act in your role as a Member or as a representative of the authority in the circumstances described in para 2 (b) below.
- b) Where you act as a representative of the authority:
 - i) on another relevant authority, you must, when acting for that other authority, comply with that other authority's code of conduct; or
 - ii) on any other body, you must, when acting for that other body, comply with the authority's code of conduct, except and insofar as it conflicts with any other lawful obligations to which that other body may be subject.

3) General Obligations

- a) You must treat others with respect.
- b) You must not:
 - i) do anything which may cause your authority to breach any of the equality enactments;
 - ii) bully any person;
 - iii) intimidate or attempt to intimidate any person who is or is likely to be:
 - (1) a complainant, a witness, or
 - (2) involved in the administration of any investigation or proceedings, in relation to an allegation that a member (including yourself) has failed to comply with the authority's Code of Conduct;
 - iv) do anything which compromises or is likely to compromise the impartiality of those who work for, or on behalf of, the authority.
- c) You must not:
 - i) disclose information given to you in confidence by anyone, or information acquired by you which you believe, or ought reasonably to be aware, is of a confidential nature, except where:
 - (1) you have the consent of a person authorised to give it;
 - (2) you are required by law to do so;
 - (3) the disclosure is made to a third party for the purpose of obtaining professional advice provided that the third party agrees not to disclose the information to any other person; or
 - (4) the disclosure is:
 - (a) reasonable and in the public interest; and
 - (b) made in good faith and in compliance with the reasonable requirements of the authority;
 - ii) prevent another person from gaining access to information to which that person is entitled by law.

- d) You must not conduct yourself in a manner which could reasonably be regarded as bringing your office or authority into disrepute.
- e) You:
 - i) must not use or attempt to use your position as a member improperly to confer on or secure for yourself or any other person, an advantage or disadvantage; and
 - ii) must, when using or authorising the use by others of the resources of, or under the control of, the authority:
 - (1) act in accordance with the authority's reasonable requirements;
 - (2) ensure that such resources are not used improperly for political purposes (including party political purposes); and
 - (3) must have regard to any applicable Local Authority Code of Publicity.
- f) You must:
 - i) when reaching decisions on any matter have regard to any relevant advice provided to you by the authority's officers and in particular by the authority's Monitoring Officer and Section 151 Officer; and
 - ii) give reasons for all decisions in accordance with any statutory requirements and any reasonable additional requirements imposed by the authority.
- g) You must not place yourself under any financial or other obligation to outside individuals or organisations that might seek to influence you in the performance of your official duties.

4) Communications and Collective Responsibility

- a) In all communications (correspondence, notices, social media, etc) with outside bodies you must express only the collective view of the Council and not your own, personal view.
- b) Correspondence with outside bodies is normally the responsibility of the Clerk. However, in some circumstances, and with the prior consent of the Council, it may be both appropriate and expedient for individual councillors to enter into correspondence with outside bodies. In such circumstances the Clerk and the Chair should be copied into all correspondence.

5) Meetings with Members of the Public / External Bodies

- a) Wherever possible, councillors should not meet with others on council business without another councillor or the Clerk present. However, the Council recognises that there may be some circumstances in which it is necessary/expedient, particularly in representing others, for council members to conduct meetings alone.

Part 2

Interests

6) Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (“DPI”)

- 7) You will have a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest (“DPI”) under this Code if:-
- a) such interest meets the definition prescribed by the Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012 as amended from time to time and set out in Appendix 2 to this Code; and
 - (b) it is either an interest of yourself; or it is an interest of :-
 - i) your spouse or civil partner; or
 - ii) a person with whom you are living as husband and wife: or
 - iii) a person with whom you are living as if you were civil partners; and you are aware that the other person has the interest.

8) Registration of DPIs

- a) You must, within 28 days of becoming a member of the authority or being re-elected, notify the Monitoring Officer in writing of any DPI which you hold at the time notification is given
- b) You must, within 28 days of becoming aware of any new DPI, or changes to existing DPIs, notify the Monitoring Officer in writing.

9) Other Disclosable Interests

- a) You will have a Disclosable Interest in any matter if you are aware that you or a member of your family or person or organisation with whom you are associated have a:-
 - i) pecuniary interest in the matter under discussion which is not de minimus; or
 - ii) a close connection with the matter under discussion.
- b) If you are a member of another local authority, or public body, or you have been appointed as the Council’s representative on an outside body, you do not have a Disclosable Interest unless a member of the public knowing the circumstances would reasonably regard membership of the body concerned as being likely to prejudice your judgment of what is in the public interest.

10) Disclosure of Interests

- a) DPIs: formal meetings:
 - i) If you are present at a meeting of the Council and you have a DPI then you must:
 - (1) Disclose the nature and existence of the interest; and
 - (2) Leave the meeting (including the meeting room and public gallery) and take no part in the discussion ; and
 - (3) If the interest has not already been recorded notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest within 28 days beginning with the date of the meeting.
- b) DPIs: informal meetings:
 - i) If you have a DPI you must not participate in informal meetings or briefings and site visits and must disclose the DPI in any correspondence with the Council.
- c) Single Member Decisions (Not applicable to Parish Councils or authorities not operating executive arrangements)
 - i) If when participating in single member decision making you have a DPI affecting the matter being decided then you may take no steps other than asking for the matter to be decided in some other manner.

11) Other Disclosable Interests

- a) If you are present at a meeting of the Council and you have an Other Disclosable Interest then you must:
 - i) Disclose the nature and existence of the interest; and
 - (1) If the interest;
 - (a) affects your pecuniary interests or relates to the determination of a planning or regulatory matter; and
 - (b) is one which a member of the public knowing the circumstances would reasonably regard as being likely to prejudice your judgment of what is in the public interest
- then you must leave the meeting (including the meeting room and public gallery) and take no part in the discussion.

12) Dispensations

- a) You may take part in the discussion of and vote on a matter in which you have a been granted a dispensation.

13) Sensitive Information

- a) An interest will be a sensitive interest if the two following conditions apply:
 - i) That you have an interest (whether or not a DPI); and
 - ii) the nature of the interest is such that you and the Monitoring Officer consider that disclosure of the details of the interest could lead to you or a person connected to you being subject to violence or intimidation.
- b) Where it is decided that an interest is a “sensitive interest ” it will be excluded from published versions of the register. The Monitoring Officer may state on the register that the member has an interest the details of which are excluded under this section.
- c) Where the sensitive interest is a DPI the usual rules relating to disclosure will apply save that the member will only be required to disclose that they hold a DPI in the matter concerned.

APPENDIX 1

The Ten Principles of Public Life

The general principles governing your conduct are set out below:

Selflessness

1. Members should serve only the public interest and should never improperly confer an advantage or disadvantage on any person.

Honesty and Integrity

2. Members should not place themselves in situations where their honesty and integrity may be questioned, should not behave improperly and should on all occasions avoid the appearance of such behaviour.

Objectivity

3. Members should make decisions on merit, including when making appointments, awarding contracts, or recommending individuals for rewards or benefits.

Accountability

4. Members should be accountable to the public for their actions and the manner in which they carry out their responsibilities, and should co-operate fully and honestly with any scrutiny appropriate to their particular office.

Openness

5. Members should be as open as possible about their actions and those of their authority, and should be prepared to give reasons for those actions.

Personal Judgement

6. Members may take account of the views of others, including their political groups, but should reach their own conclusions on the issues before them and act in accordance with those conclusions.

Respect for Others

7. Members should promote equality by not discriminating unlawfully against any person, and by treating people with respect, regardless of their race, age, religion, gender, sexual orientation or disability. They should respect the impartiality and integrity of the authority's statutory officers, and its other employees.

Duty to Uphold the Law

8. Members should uphold the law and, on all occasions, act in accordance with the trust that the public is entitled to place in them.

Stewardship

9. Members should do whatever they are able to do to ensure that their authorities use their resources prudently and in accordance with the law.

Leadership

10. Members should promote and support these principles by leadership, and by example, and should act in a way that secures or preserves public confidence.

APPENDIX 2

The Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012

<i>Subject</i>	<i>Prescribed description</i>
Employment, office, trade, profession or vocation	Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
Sponsorship	Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the relevant authority) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expenses incurred by a member of a relevant authority in carrying out duties as a member, or towards the election expenses of a member of a relevant authority; This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.
Contracts	Any contract which is made between the relevant person (or a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest) and the relevant authority— (a) under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed; and (b) which has not been fully discharged.
Land	Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of the relevant authority.
Licences	Any licence (alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of the relevant authority for a month or longer.
Corporate tenancies	Any tenancy where (to the knowledge of a member of a relevant authority)— (a) the landlord is the relevant authority; and (b) the tenant is a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest.
Securities	Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where— (a) that body (to the knowledge of a member of a relevant authority) has a place of business or land in the area of the relevant authority; and (b) either— (i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or (ii) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

Definitions:

“the Act” means the Localism Act 2011;

“body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest” means a firm in which the relevant person is a partner or a body corporate of which the relevant person is a director, or in the securities of which the relevant person has a beneficial interest;

“director” includes a member of the committee of management of an industrial and provident society;

“land” excludes an easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not carry with it a right for the relevant person (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive income;

“member” includes a co-opted member;

“relevant authority” means the authority of which a member of a relevant authority is a member;

“relevant period” means the period of 12 months ending with the day on which a member of a relevant authority gives a notification for the purposes of section 30(1) or section 31(7), as the case may be, of the Act;

“relevant person” means a member of a relevant authority or any other person referred to in section 30(3)(b) of the Act;

“securities” means shares, debentures, debenture stock, loan stock, bonds, units of a collective investment scheme within the meaning of the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000 and other securities of any description, other than money deposited with a building society.
